Both have demonstrated dedication to improving their skills on the mat and maintaining a solid work ethic in the classroom, just as the legacy Michael Jackson left in the WCHS wrestling room, according to Michael Jackson Scholarship Board member Randy Cotton. Their commitment to the sport has not gone unnoticed, as they have been awarded accolades for their remarkable achievements. These two young wrestlers serve as an inspiration to their peers, and their success is a testament to the rewards that come with hard work, determination, and a passion for what you do, according to Cotton.

"I've been wrestling for six years and it makes me feel great to know that my hard work was noticed by the folks at the Michael Jackson Scholarship," said Wilkinson. "Through wrestling, I learned I should never give up and push through challenging situations. The sport has shown me how to be physically and mentally strong. For now, I will keep working on the things I can control, like my weight and strength, so I can be the best wrestler I can be next season." Cox, a fourth-grader at the School for the Creative and Performing Arts in Lexington, said he likes to compete and was excited to win this award. He also commented that he thought the trophy was "really cool".
